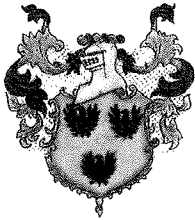

Mr. Gladney, 86, passed away Saturday afternoon, April 16, 2016 at the Elsberry Health Care Center near Elsberry. Born December 1, 1929 in the Okete community in central Lincoln County near Elsberry, he was the son of Clarence Sidney

and Ima Grace Barrett Gladney. As a youth, Forrest attended Mt. Zion Presbyterian Church in Okete, MO. Forrest was united in marriage on July 10, 1970 in Elsberry to Hazel Mae Barnes. He later became a member of New Hope Baptist Church. He served as trustee, head usher, and door greeter during his years of membership. He was also a founding member of the Lincoln County Old Threshers and stayed active until 2008.

Forrest farmed in the Okete area for over 65 years. He also worked as a tractor mechanic at LaRue and Fletcher's during the 1970s. During the 80s, he was employed for a short time at Croft Electric in Troy, MO.

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MEETING WITH IRELAND COUSIN, NED GLADNEY

During our two week visit to Ireland in April 2016, we had the opportunity to meet in Dublin with a Gladney cousin, Edward (Ned) Gladney and his lovely wife, Barbara Kelly. We had been on the go for two weeks straight and were leaving early the next morning but, I really wanted to connect with our Ireland relatives.

Since Ned knows the area, we asked him to choose the restaurant taking into account that we only brought casual clothes. I refuse to dress up on vacation! He chose Romano's Restaurant on Capel Street in Dublin. The food was great.

We talked a while about the Gladney connection. The southern Ireland Gladneys were mostly centered in New Ross, County Wexford, Ireland, where Ned was born. We discussed Ned's father, James Gladney that married Julia Kelly, his grandfather Edward Gladney, and his great grandfather Patrick Gladney. In the 1800-1900's, some Gladneys immigrated from County Wexford to Newfoundland, Canada.

One story that Ned told was that his great grandfather, Patrick Gladney, had the only car in the area. There was a part wood and part metal bridge in town. The speed limit was 20 kph over the bridge. Patrick Gladney was responsible for imposing the speed limit until 6:00pm. After that time, everyone was on their own.

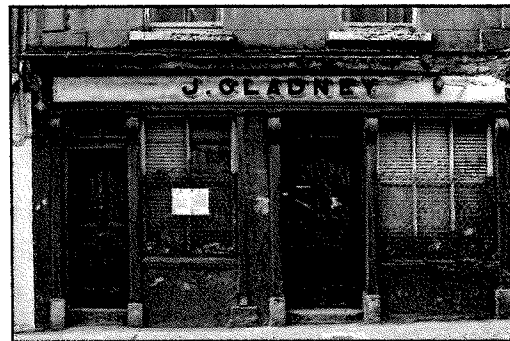
Ned's family owned a pub in New Ross named 'J. Gladney'. The pub is no longer in business but, Barbara mentioned that they would love to go through the building to see what is still there. Below is a pic-

ture of the pub as it looks today (for those receiving this via US Postal Mail, the building and doors are vivid red and above the sign is gray).

Barbara is very interested in updating their information in the Gladney "Big Blue Book". They adopted a little girl and want the correct information to be available to her. I have emailed Ned and asked for some information to get started with but have not heard back from him. I do hope they follow up on the updates.

Michael Gladney, a cousin of Ned's, was appointed as Collector General of Ireland in 2012. Michael is a native of Glynn, County Carlow, and was educated in New Ross. The Collector General position is responsible for the collection and recovery of all main taxes in Ireland. Since Ireland cannot file a law suit against an individual, Michael's office is responsible for filing all suits to recover past due taxes.

There was also discussion on the religion of the Ireland Gladneys. Ned hypothesized that either the Gladneys that landed in Wexford in the 1700's changed their religion to Catholic to fit into their community OR the Gladneys that landed in Antrim changed their religion to Protestant to fit into theirs.

**2016 GLADNEY FAMILY
REUNION—LEXINGTON, KY**

First, I want to thank Wally and Dean and their family for all of the hard work that went into making the 2016 Gladney Family Reunion a very enjoyable experience.

On Friday, July 29, 2016, we gathered in the lobby of the Holiday Inn Express & Suites Lexington Northeast at 12:00 noon and boarded the comfy charter bus at 12:45 and headed out.

I have never been a horse person so I wasn't particularly excited when I heard that we would be touring horse farms.

But my expectations were greatly exceeded. I thoroughly enjoyed the WinStar Farm located in Versailles, KY where Super Saver, the 2010 Kentucky Derby winner, began his stud career. He performs three times a day, seven days a week for a fee of \$65,000 per performance.

Also at WinStar Farm is two-time Breeder's Cup Classic winner Tiznow. He was an immediate success at stud and has gone on to become one of the most reliable sires of quality. Tiznow was led by one of the young Gladneys and her parents captured the moment for posterity.

We then proceeded to KESMARC (Kentucky Sports Medicine And Rehabilitation Center) also located in Versailles. KESMARC is a pioneer in horse rehabilitation and a world leader in equine hyperbaric medicine. We watched horses go into the circular swimming pool and the Aquatred which is a custom in-ground underwater treadmill. The facility is more than 70,000 sq ft and is all under one roof. Our guide explained that they use 36 degree F saltwater to rapidly reduce swelling and inflammation of the legs. Performing the underwater aerobic workout conditions the whole body and enhances circulation. She explained that the blood in a horse's legs does not circulate if the horse is just standing. So, the more the horse moves, the better it is for healing.

On Friday night, we gathered in the Horse Park Meeting Room at the hotel for some light snacks including Bourbon Balls. I'm not a drinker and didn't know what to expect. Had they told me that they would be dipped in chocolate, I would have known that I would love them. They were absolutely delicious and were the hit of the night. The children of Wally and Dean had prepared a meal delicious for us. It was en-

joyed by all.

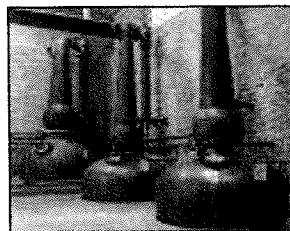
On Saturday, July 30, 2016, we rose early and Buffalo Trace Distillery (119 acres and 114 buildings) in Frankfort, KY and Woodford Reserve Distillery back in Versailles, KY. Our guide at Buffalo Trace, Freddie Johnson, was quite a character. He had a career before giving tours at the distillery. But, his father was ill and had Freddie make two promises; to take care of him during his illness so that he could sleep in his own bed and attend his lifelong church and to work in some capacity at the distillery so that there would have been three generations of his family employed there at some point in time. A wall commemorates his family's contributions to the company.

They say that there are ghosts in the buildings at the distillery. Freddie's father told the story that of the many barrels in the storage building, many of them were required to be moved so that the newer barrels were together in the warehouse. Freddie's father was in charge of the crew that would move the barrels. They came in early and began moving the barrels. When about two thirds finished, his father suggested that they take a break before completing the move. They went out the back door and sat on a small walkway and leaned against the back wall of the building where it was cool. After a few minutes, he heard someone say, "Move men, now." He looked around thinking one of the men was playing a joke. He heard it again, "Move, now." The other men heard it, too. One of the men said that he was going to move, just in case. He left the walkway and stood in a gravel area near the side of the building. In a preponderance of caution, the other men, including Freddie's

father, followed him. When the last man stepped onto the gravel, the back wall of the building collapsed onto the place the men had been sitting.

Freddie kept us all entertained while walking the tour. We saw the way the bourbon ages inside the barrel and how the amount of bourbon inside the barrels decreases the longer it is inside the barrel. We also saw the very small area where the bourbon is bottled by hand. He explained the significance of the horses and jockeys on top of the cork used to seal the bottles. Each horse has a letter on its back leg. And, each horse and jockey is in a different position. The corks are very collectible for this reason. When we reached the tasting area, he explained each type of bourbon and introduced us to "the dog", a moonshiner's trick to determine the quality and ingredients of liquor without tasting it. The trick involves pouring the liquor into your hand, then slapping, waving, and smelling. Buffalo Trace Distillery has the world's smallest bonded warehouse which holds a single barrel. The barrel's production number is 6,000,000 and features the signatures of Freddie's father, his daughter, and his grandson.

Woodford Reserve Distillery is distilled in very large, copper "pot stills" from Scotland. Bourbon is made from corn, barley, and rye. They use limestone filtered water and ferment in Cyprus wood vats for six days. It was also noted that the water in the area also helps the race horses bone development. After the

tour, we visited the large, remodeled "building on the hill" where the gift shop and restaurant are located. The view of the facility from the large wrap around porch was beautiful.

At this point, we headed back to the hotel where we had the afternoon to ourselves. Tim and Timmy Johnson, Tonnie Adams, and my family had lunch at A&W. I had never tried the A&W Root Beer Float. It was very good as was the chicken wrap.

The business meeting was held at 4:30pm. Then, the banquet began at 6pm in the Rupp Arena Room in the hotel. President Tonnie Adams thanked our hosts, Wally and Dean and their family, and then introduced the new officers. The members that traveled the longest distance were members of Virgil and Julie Gladney's family from Mesa, Arizona. We enjoyed a catered buffet dinner provided by Rose White and her family. Then, we had a short comedy skit by a local Kentucky lady, Barbie Moren. While some members watched "Blossoms in the Dust" about Edna Gladney and her founding of the Gladney Center for Adoption in Texas, some members chose to catch up on what's been going on with them during the past year.

Following Ken Kirkpatrick's death this past year, I contacted Ken's sons to see if they would be interested in continuing their father's work taking care of the Gladney cemetery in Winnsboro, SC. They all have their own jobs and don't have the time that will be needed to take care of the cemetery. Jim and Judy Whitesell took it upon themselves to cut the grass and take care of the cemetery until a permanent caretaker can be found. We love them and thank them profusely for their service to

our family. We can always depend on them and their family to go above and beyond the call.

On Sunday morning, July 31, 2016, after a hot breakfast, a devotional was given in the Horse Park Meeting Room by Wally and Dean's senior's pastor at their church. We all reluctantly said goodbye until next year and headed in different directions to go home.

The 2017 Gladney Family Reunion will be held in Winnsboro, SC where our original Gladney emigrants settled. The plan is to stay in Blythewood, SC where the accommodations are better suited to our family. Details will be in upcoming Gladney Grams. So, please plan to join us on July 28 through 30, 2017.

Then, in 2018, we will celebrate 250 years of our Gladneys being in America. George and Janice Sakash will host our family in Charleston, SC where the widow Jane Gladney and her sons first set foot on American soil.
