97 REUNION Winnsboro, SC

Peeting at the Fairfield Motel, some of the Gladney Clan began to arrive on Tuesday, July 22nd. Dr. James & Margaret Gladney, Cynthia Gladney Steele, Charles S. Gladney, Gene & Bettye Bond began putting final touches on the Old Gladney Cemetery and the hay barn upon a hill in the meadow of the Jackson Creek Gladney land grant property.

Ed Stevenson had the cemetery mowed and he bushawged the area around the barn to facilitate parking for the picnic.

After dinner on the 23rd, Gene & Bettye proceeded to the Old Rock Church Cemetery, using a weed-eater to clean the graves known to them and to make a path to them from the old Church walls. Vandals had done much destruction to some of the old markers in a wide strip by the old Church. However only a couple of the Gladney descendants' markers were broken. For that we can be thankful.

When Julia & Mike Glenn, and her parents, Gladney and Laura Kerr, arrived Thursday, they took over the weed-eater detail and did a wonderful job clearing the entire front half of the Rock Church Cemetery. The morning started with breakfast catered by the Lamppost.

9:00 a.m. caravan to Old Rock Church Cemetery.

10:00 a.m. caravan to Gladney Cemetery for dedication of the graves. Members of the 6th North Carolina Revolutionary War Historical Society, Dusty Simmons, Captain, in full uniform, opened the ceremony with the presentation of the colors.

Revolutionary era costumes were worn by Virginia Ivens, Julia Kerr Glenn and Bettye Bond.

Crystal Wellborn-Gregg was master of ceremonies during the dedication. Mrs. E. (Delores) Everet, Pennsylvania State Chairman of Bylaws and Regent of CYMRY Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Colonists, placed the wreath on the grave of Jane Wilson Gladney, as an original land grant recipient after the marker

dedication by Bettye Bond of CYMRY Chapter & GIAFA Vice President.

Markers on the graves of Janette Gaston Strong, Jane Strong Gladney and Agnes McCreight Gladney were sponsored by the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Gladney Family members who were NSDAR members performed the dedication and placing of the wreaths on the graves.

Visiting, locating graves, headstone rubbings and picture taking were the most important tasks at hand for about an hour.

At about noon we moved up to the hay barn, on a hill just above the cemetery. Wonderful sandwiches were made and delivered to the barn by Terry Rowekamp, owner of "Yummies" in Winnsboro.



Introduction to Dr. Dru Gladney

ru C. Gladney is Professor of Asian Studies at the University of Hawaii in the School of Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific Studies (SHAPS). He is also serving in a joint appointment as a Senior Research Fellow at the East-West Center. A PhD in Social Anthropology from the University of Washington, Seattle, in 1987, Dr. Gladney has twice held Fulbright Research Scholar fellowships, in Turkey (1992-93) and China (1983-84). Prior to his association with University of Hawaii, he served as Assistant Professor of Anthropology at the University of Southern California. He has held post-doctoral fellowships from the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, and Harvard University, Center for International Affairs. He has conducted over 3 years of field research in China, as well as more recent projects in Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzia, and Turkey. In China, several months of extensive research and residence have been conducted in Beijing, Xinjiang, Gansu, Fujian, Yunnan, and Tibet.

Dr. Gladney conducts research on ethnic and cultural nationalism, focusing on issues of identity, economy, nation-state formation, transnationalism, representation, and religion. Regions of expertise include China, Central Asia, and Turkey. He has served as a consultant to the World Bank, UNESCO, the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, the Smithsonian Institution, and the National Academy of Sciences. Research languages include Mandarin Chinese, Turkish, Uygur, Uzbek, Kazakh, Russian.

He is the author of the award-winning book, Muslim Chinese: Ethnic Nationalism in the People's Republic (Harvard University Press, 1996, 1st edition 1991) as well as three new books in press: Dislocating China: Muslims, Minorities, and Other Sub-Altern Subjects (London, C. Hurst); Ethnic Identity in China: The Making of a Muslim Minority Nationality (Harcourt Brace); and Making Majorities: Composing the Nation in Japan, China, Korea, Malaysia, Fiji, Turkey, and the U.S. (Editor, Stanford University Press). His articles have appeared in The Journal of Asian Studies, Current History, Public Culture, Central Asian Survey, History and Anthropology, The Fletcher Forum of World Affairs, The International Journal of Middle Eastern Studies, and China Exchange News.

Dr. Gladney's recent research has been featured on CNN's "Global View" with Ralph Begleiter, "Business Asia" with Fred Katayama, and in interviews with CNN's Beijing correspondent Rebecca MacKinnon. He has been interviewed and cited in Newsweek, Time Magazine, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times, the International Herald Tribune, the Asian Wall Street Journal, Forbes, National Public Radio, Voice of America, and Hawaii Public Radio, KHON Channel 2, and Channel 4.

Research grants and contract services have awarded by the National Academy of Sciences, the Social Science Research Council, the MacArthur Foundation, Fulbright, UNESCO, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, IREX, Wenner-Gren Foundation, Woodrow Wilson Foundation, Harvard Academy for International and Area Studies, the Mellon Foundation, and the National Endowment for Humanities.
