## 2010 REUNION-July 23-25

Newnan, Georgia, The City of Homes, is the location for the 2010 Gladney Family Reunion. On July 23, 24, and 25, Gladneys from all over the U.S. will head to Newnan to visit with cousins that we haven't seen since we met in Winnsboro, SC last year.

I have made arrangements with the Country Inn and Suites in Newnan to receive a reduced rate of \$65 per night. The motel is located at 1125 Newnan Crossing Blvd. East in Newnan. You will need to call the motel directly to receive the reduced rate. Their direct phone number is 770-304-8500. Tell them that you have a room reserved for the Gladney Family Reunion. For the \$65 rate (less than the online rate and the AARP rate), you will receive either a double queen room or a king room. If you like, you can even upgrade to a suite for an additional \$5. The Parrott-Camp-Soucy home as it is now known, was built in the 1840s by William Nimmons, one of the first white settlers in Coweta County, GA. In 1885, Judge John S. Bigby bought the home as a wedding gift for his daughter, Callie Bigby Parrott. In 1885, the then Greek revival home was "Victorianized" with elaborate moldings and woodwork. In 1936 the house was bought by the Camp family.

The home was purchased by Chuck and Doris Soucy from the Camp family in 1984, and it took two years to restore it to its original splendor. The interior woodwork is such that every room has a different kind of wood trim. This meant that the doors had to be built as a "sandwich" of two different woods in order to match the trim in the rooms the door served. gerardjansen.com/parrot

## A LITTLE HISTORY OF NEWNAN, GEORGIA

Newnan, Georgia was incorporated in 1823 and was named form General Daniel Newnan. The city is located about twenty-five miles southwest of Atlanta's Hartsfield-Jackson Airport and is just off I-85. The city has over 28,000 residents with Coweta County exceeding 115,000 residents.

Newnan was a wealthy cotton market before and after the Civil War. It was designated as the "hospital city of the Confederacy" during the Civil War, having seven field hospitals. The city was by-passed by General Sherman. As a result, Newnan has one of the best collections of pre-Civil War homes in the country.

Newnan is located on the old Atlanta and West Point railroad. A cavalry battle, the Battle of Brown's Mill, was fought here on July 30, 1864, between Union Brig. Gen. E. M. McCook's 3,600 men and Confederate Major Gen. "Fighting" Joe Wheeler's 1,400 men. Wheeler routed the Union forces, capturing 2,000 (a full battery) and releasing 500 Confederate prisoners who had been captured days earlier by Gen. McCook in Favetteville. Wheeler's message to Gen. John Bell Hood in Atlanta about the battle was, "we have just completed the killing, capturing, and breaking up of the entire raiding party under General McCook." McCook was participating in the Great Cavalry Raid or Stoneman-McCook Raid, Sherman's plan to destroy the railroads south of Atlanta. McCook was to swing around the west side of Atlanta and Stoneman around the east, where they would meet in Lovejoy, south of Atlanta, and proceed to tear up the tracks to Macon.

McCook got to Lovejoy, but Stoneman was not there. When Wheeler's men drew near

McCook turned back west toward Newnan. Wheeler's success meant the town was spared capture and possible destruction. So today, Newnan is known as the City of Homes because of its outstanding examples of period and contemporary architecture. More than 22 antebellum homes are found here in five National Register Historic Districts.

Oak Hill Cemetery became the final resting place for soldiers who did not survive the Civil War. In 1863 and 1864, 268 Confederate soldiers were buried in a section of the Cemetery honoring these soldiers, only two of which are unknown. Every state in the Confederacy is represented here. Revolutionary War soldiers and two Georgia governors from Newnan (Governor Ellis Arnall and Governor William Atkinson) are remembered here.

There is a reason Newnan is called The City of Homes. When Sherman made his march through Atlanta and eastward, he made a stop in Newnan. Newnan has six historic districts with all six being on the National Historic Register. The houses contained in the historic districts are mainly of the Victorian and antebellum styles. However, the downtown business district consists of Neo-Classical, Italianate, Classical Revival, Romanesque, Queen Ann, and Victorian styles. Although the homes are occupied by private individuals, each year around Christmastime, a few of these families allow charity tours through their homes to enjoy the decorations and indulge in snacks and spiced apple cider.

Allene Springer, 77, died Wednesday, March 25, 2009, at Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis. She was born Aug. 4, 1931, in Union County. She spent most of her childhood in Houston and graduated from Houston High School. She received her bachelor's degree from Mississippi State College for Women and her master's degree from Mississippi State College. She began her teaching career in Houston, and then taught 15 years at Overstreet School. She was also a teacher and longtime elementary principal at Starkville Academy. Following her retirement, she taught part-time in the Elementary Education Department at Mississippi State.

She was a member of the Hic-a-sha-ba-ha chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She served as the chapter Regent, Vice Regent and Historian. She was a charter member of Delta Kappa Gamma and served as chapter president and president of the Northern District, and was named a Woman of Distinction. In 1999, she received a Circle of Excellence Award given by Mississippi State University's College of Education. She joined First Baptist Church in 1955 and was a member of the Joy Sunday School class.

Services were held at 11 a.m. Friday at First Baptist Church in Starkville. Burial will be in Oddfellows Cemetery in Starkville. Welch Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include her husband of 56 years, Edward; four daughters, Carol Springer-Kelly of Houston, Texas, Cathy Kemp (Terry) of Starkville, Edie Gray (Ronnie) of Dallas, Texas, and Charlotte Cox (Holland) of Starkville; her grandchildren, Emily Lesley (Brian), Edward Kemp (Leah), Elizabeth Kemp, Susannah Cox, Sam Cox, Charlie Cox, Beau Cox, Mitchell Gray, Colin Gray, Mallory Gray and Celeste Kelly; and two greatgrandchildren, Beckett and John Scott Lesley.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Robert Samuel and Zilda Gladney Mitchell.
